 - b. About your perceptions
 - c. About your dreams / ideas
 - d. About your challenges
 - e. About your fears
 - f. About those who criticize you
- 3. Memorize and protect your ministry vision.
 - a. Understand its "scope"
 - b. Understand its limits
 - c. Let it guide you
 - d. Let it protect you from involvement in non-vision efforts
- 4. Establish, and maintain, ministry policies.
 - a. Let them guide you
 - b. Refer to them personally, to your team, and to others
 - c. Never break them
- 5. Discuss everything with your respected friends or spouse.
 - a. Share your dreams
 - b. Share your fears
 - c. Share your challenges
 - d. Ask for advice
 - e. Listen to, and follow, their advice
